

INDIANA'S FEDERAL WATER FUNDING




The EPA's Drinking Water and Clean Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF and CWSRF) represent the nation's largest federal investment in drinking water and wastewater infrastructure, enabling states to better meet urgent water system needs in their communities. In recent years, \$882 million in SRF funds has helped Indiana address a portion of its \$21.9 billion in infrastructure investment needs.

Indiana has relied on \$882 million in SRF support since 2022

Since 2022, Indiana has been allotted **\$551 million** for the state's DWSRF, including **\$308 million** to replace lead pipelines, and **\$331 million** for the state's CWSRF. These funds have supported local projects like the replacement of thousands of lead service lines including 4,000 in Gary by the Indiana American Water Company, and expansions and upgrades to Greenfield's Wastewater Treatment Plan, which are modernizing 1960's infrastructure and increasing capacity to meet a growing population. The Indiana Financing Authority is receiving an [estimated \\$26 million](#) set-aside to support program administration.

Federal support for the SRFs has increased since 2022



An additional \$43 billion was appropriated for the SRFs by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and is being distributed annually between 2022 and 2026.

\$21.9 billion in future water infrastructure needs

Per the latest [Drinking Water Infrastructure Needs Survey and Assessment](#) and [Clean Watershed Needs Survey](#), Indiana is anticipated to need **\$11.8 billion** in drinking water investments and **\$10.1 billion** in wastewater investments over the next two decades. The federal investments over the last four years help address **4 percent** of this gap, but further funding is required to maintain the state's water systems.
