

NEW YORK'S FEDERAL WATER FUNDING




The EPA's Drinking Water and Clean Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF and CWSRF) represent the nation's largest federal investment in drinking water and wastewater infrastructure, enabling states to better meet urgent water system needs in their communities. In recent years, \$2.6 billion in SRF funds has helped New York address a portion of its \$89 billion in infrastructure investment needs.

New York has relied on \$2.6 billion in SRF support since 2022

Since 2022, New York has been allotted **\$1.2 billion** for the state's DWSRF, including **\$550 million** to replace lead pipelines, and **\$1.4 billion** for the state's CWSRF. These funds have supported local projects including improvements to three facilities in the Albany Water system, addressing aging infrastructure, and the construction of a consolidated treatment plant in Chemung County to protect water quality in the Chemung River and Chesapeake Bay Watershed. The New York Environmental Facilities Corporation is receiving an [estimated \\$12.7 million](#) set-aside to support program administration.

Federal support for the SRFs has increased since 2022



An additional \$43 billion was appropriated for the SRFs by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and is being distributed annually between 2022 and 2026.

\$89 billion in future water infrastructure needs

Per the latest [Drinking Water Infrastructure Needs Survey and Assessment](#) and [Clean Watershed Needs Survey](#), New York is anticipated to need **\$35 billion** in drinking water investments and **\$54 billion** in

wastewater investments over the next two decades. The federal investments over the last four years help address **2.9 percent** of this gap, but further funding is required to maintain the state's water systems.
