

# NORTH DAKOTA'S FEDERAL WATER FUNDING

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


The EPA's Drinking Water and Clean Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF and CWSRF) represent the nation's largest federal investment in drinking and wastewater infrastructure, enabling states to better meet urgent water system needs in their communities. In recent years, \$327 million in SRF funds has helped North Dakota address a portion of its \$5.8 billion in infrastructure investment needs.

## North Dakota has relied on \$327 million in SRF support since 2022

Since 2022, North Dakota has been allotted **\$259 million** for the state's DWSRF, including **\$114 million** to replace lead pipelines, and **\$67 million** for the state's CWSRF. These funds have supported local projects including the replacement of 350 lead service lines in Bismarck, and the modernization of Bismarck's wastewater treatment infrastructure to manage growing wastewater system needs safely and reliably. The North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality is receiving an [estimated \\$4.6 million](#) set-aside to support program administration.

### Federal support for the SRFs has increased since 2022



An additional \$43 billion was appropriated for the SRFs by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and is being distributed annually between 2022 and 2026.

## \$5.8 billion in future water infrastructure needs

Per the latest [Drinking Water Infrastructure Needs Survey and Assessment](#) and [Clean Watershed Needs Survey](#), North Dakota is anticipated to need **\$3.2 billion** in drinking water investments and **\$2.6 billion** in wastewater investments over the next two decades. The federal investments over the last four years help address **5.6 percent** of this gap, but further funding is required to maintain the state's water systems.
